Melinda and her family lived with me for a while. Melinda, 13, was terrified her mom would be killed when she was drinking on Main St. She wanted to go look for her if she hadn't come home by nightfall.

The first time, I suggested we pray for her mom's safety instead. I could tell Melinda didn't know what to do with that. I suspect she's never been inside a church before or prayed. But as she realized I wasn't going to let her go down Main St, she agreed.

I prayed that mom would be safe and that she would come home. Mom came home the next day, safe. The next time when Melinda was all in a panic over mom drinking, we prayed again. And the next time too. Mom came home safely, each time. But the next time I forgot to pray. Just as I was leaving her bedroom, Melinda shyly reminded me that I hadn't prayed for her mom yet. And so I prayed again. I could see in Melinda's suggestion a tiny seed of faith had grown.

Maria, also part of the family living with me, was having trouble falling asleep at nights. She didn't know why, but the doctor wanted to give her meds. I asked her if I could pray for her instead. I've had a few conversations with Maria about the Lord, but she doesn't really know what to think of Him. She hasn't heard too much about Him in her life I don't think. She somewhat reluctantly agreed.

She had a great sleep that night, falling asleep right away. The next night I asked her if she wanted me to pray for her again. She enthusiastically said, yes. A tiny seed of faith planted within Maria's heart.

Georgette, one of our first Work Force youth, now a young adult, could not do things on her own. Apply for school, ask for help in looking for an apartment, get her little girl into daycare....A voice in her head always told her she would look like a fool, because she was on her own. She'd get unbelievable butterflies in her stomach. Hence, her life was going nowhere.

She very much wanted to get into school, but just couldn't make herself go to register. I asked her if she'd like me to pray for her, if she would be open to healing prayer. She said she was. We prayed, with me not really sure what I was doing, but Jesus met her in a very real way. As Georgette was quiet and waiting on Jesus, He told her she wasn't alone. He was with her. The butterflies immediately left her stomach. She felt "pretty good" – relief. As Georgette listened to Jesus, seeds of faith began to blossom.

To these young people, these little things are huge in their lives. God at work in lives is always huge. I am so blessed to have these young people in my life – I get to see Jesus in them. Wow! As I celebrate Jesus' arrival this Christmas, I am so thankful that in my and others' lives, Jesus is very much alive and present. There is much to rejoice about!

Understanding

Conflict

Did you know that Conflict is a misunderstanding, disagreement, or fight between two or more people? Conflict contributes to the daily stress of life. Many people avoid conflict. Some people aggressively attack conflict. Very few people enjoy or appreciate conflict.

We all experience conflict with others. Conflicts tend to be more encompassing in a teens life as an adolescent is discovering how they fit in, or are on high alert for being embarrassed or perceived to be a coward by others. I just had lunch with a 13 year old boy Matty, who lives just down the street from BAF. He told of numerous incidents where he had gotten into violent fights with other kids.



One time he was beaten up by some kids on a gravel lot. Another incident involved his temper getting out of control and he stabbed another boy in the leg. Not too long ago, Matty

found himself running away from some guys in a car with a gun. Matty says that it is often his anger that gets him into trouble, causing him to lash out against others.

Matty is similar to the kids we work with at St. John's High School. We provide a Conflict Group for guys and girls that are getting into arguments or fights at school. Like Matty, many of these youth lack the understanding and tools to deal with conflict in a positive way.

We provide these youth with some tools to use when they find themselves in a conflict including a "Stop, Breathe, Chill" approach to allow one to think before reacting. We teach them to stand up for themselves with dignity when faced with a confrontation and to do it without fighting or disrespecting the other person. We also give the youth opportunity to work through conflicts they have gone through or are currently in.

Through this partnership with St. John's High School, we have a great opportunity to get to know more youth and build relationships with them and share the good news of Jesus.

Women's Bible Study

Tuesday evening- it's the regular hour for our weekly women's bible study, and my living room resembles a disaster area. Scraps of paper strewn over the floor, an ironing board and iron set up across one corner, heaps of various colours of fabric piled on the coffee table, and on all available chairs - what is going on?

This fall, in our study, we've been digging into the book of Romans. But this tangle of bits of everything is not about Romans. Instead, we decided, as a group, to prepare an advent hanging for the sanctuary at Bethlehem this Christmas. The term "advent" is new to some, and we've been thinking about the concept of "waiting" and "watching" for the coming of Christ over the four Sundays that precede Christmas.

And so we've been learning some elementary techniques in fabric art, as we prepare eight symbols (two each week) depicting God's preparation for sending Messiah into the world on that first Christmas morning: a woman, an angel, the tables of the Law, a manger, a prophet, a candle, a shoot out of a dry stump, and a sceptre and crown.

We are learning more of God's preparations and faithfulness in keeping His promises; we're learning a new skill; we're learning how to read scripture aloud to the congregation; we're learning to co-operate to produce something beautiful for God. And we're having a great time together as we do all these things. Best of all, we're learning in a new way, to anticipate with joy, the second appearance of Jesus. Even so, come, Lord Jesus!
