## Blanket Exercise

BAF decided we wanted to do something relevant for reconciliation to commemorate the second annual Truth and Reconciliation Day. We invited Living Word (the church we rent from) to help us host what is called a "Blanket Exercise". This is an interactive activity that illustrates how the policies enacted by colonialism have impacted and affected First Nations People. It is a retelling of the history of Canada from an Indigenous context that is not always included in the history of our nation.

Using a number of blankets spread out on a floor to represent the land, the exercise starts at the first contact between first nations and settlers. It walks through the broken promises/ treaty negotiations, the Indian Act and the residential schools right up to the present societal impact of colonialism showing how damaging it was for Indigenous people. Slowly throughout the exercise, the land (blankets) are removed and valued cultural items are taken away. It is a very contextual eye-opening experience for all.

The scriptures tell us that the church has a "ministry of reconciliation" and a "message of reconciliation" as ambassadors for Christ. All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. 2 Cor 5:18-20a.

This challenges and calls us within our churches to do something towards finding ways to work at reconciliation.



This is also in accord with the #59 Call to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission that states: "We call upon the church parties to the Settlement Agreement to develop ongoing education strategies to ensure that their respective congregation learn about their church's role in colonization, the history and legacy of residential schools and why apologies to former residential school students, their families and communities are necessary".

We were very pleased with the turn out for this Blanket Exercise. We had a full house which exceeded all expectations. Our hope is that as churches get more and more educated it would further help us journey down this road of reconciliation.
